

CPHS small group/homebound vaccines update

(Oversight Board meeting 11/30/2023)

- ▶ To date in Fall 2023 season CPHS nurses have administered
 - ▶ 284 vaccines (247 people)
 - ▶ 60 doses of Moderna/Spikevax age 12 plus formula given at home visits
 - ▶ 60 more doses of Moderna/Spikevax have been ordered
- ▶ Nurses will continue to carry flu vaccine (and address homebound/convenience needs of people attending drop-in CPHS nursing hours for COVID) as purchased supplies last.
- ▶ CDC reports from 2018-2022 the overall percentage of eligible people receiving flu vaccine in U.S. about 50%
- ▶ Current data (through 11/23/23) indicates overall Franklin County vaccination rates of 32% for flu; 21.5% for COVID; and 18% for RSV
- ▶ Beginning 12/7, vaccine data including county and municipality level data will be included in the viral respiratory illness dashboard at <https://www.mass.gov/info-details/viral-respiratory-illness-reporting>

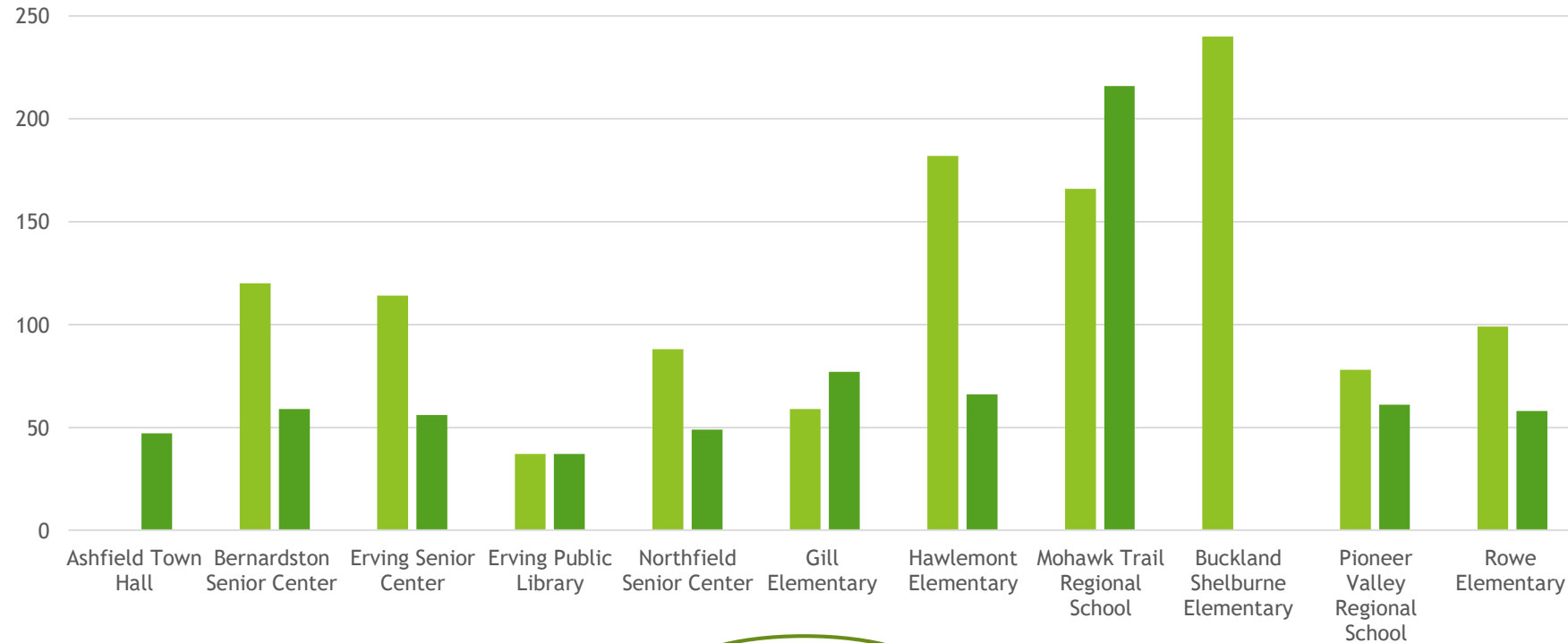
- Here are the raw numbers for attendance and total # of doses (combined C19 and flu) given out at each clinic.
- Caveats: Ashfield and Rowe were impacted in a big way by the national supply chain issues with the COVID vaccine: Rowe needed to reschedule in order to have COVID vaccine, and the COVID vaccine delivery that was supposed to arrive for Ashfield, didn't.

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Attendance at larger vaccine clinics each year



Senior Centers: One lesson from 2022 was that having 50-70 ppl/clinic was manageable for their space/time.

This year, SCs hosted between 49-59 ppl/clinic.



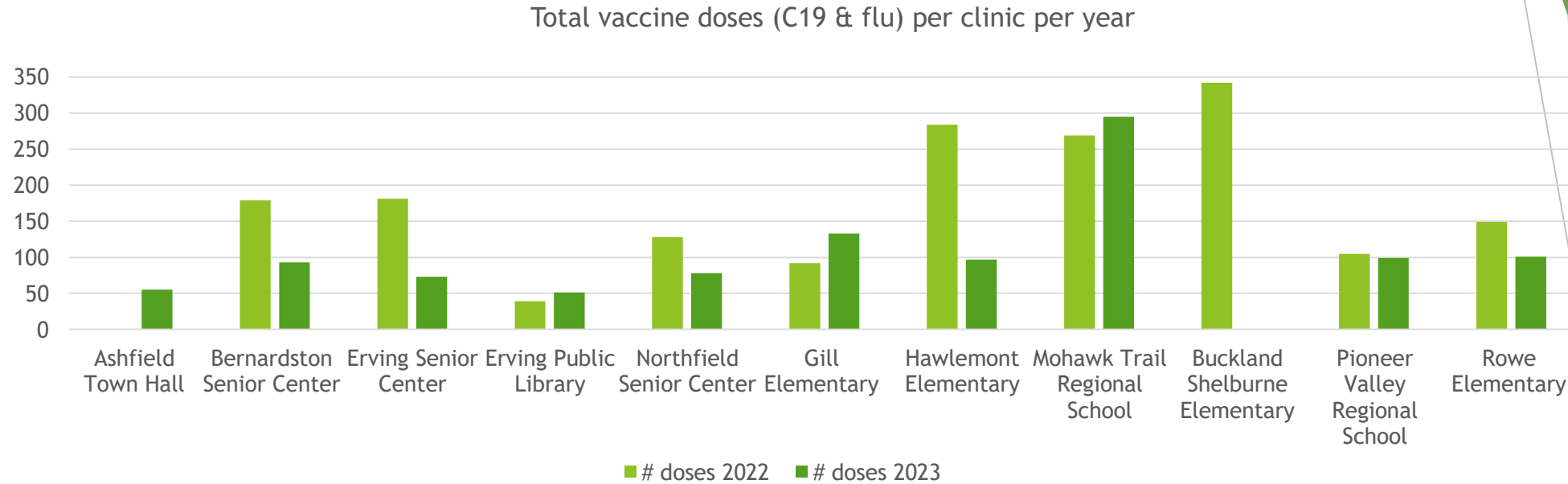
Schools: Typically can handle larger attendance (100+ people) per clinic.

This year: Issues with vendor likely lead to lower attendance (limiting sign ups, poor staffing--leading to slow throughput, and not allocating enough vaccine).

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Cumulative decrease in doses from 2022 to 2023:

- ✓ Expected when decreasing senior center clinics sizes
- ✓ Expected when having fewer school clinics

Unexpected obstacles that likely played a role in lower attendance and therefore fewer # doses:

- ✓ Ashfield had 91 sign ups and then had 47 people show up when it was clear that it was flu-only for adults.
- ✓ Hawlemont served 182 individuals in 2022. In 2023, Cataldo initially capped sign up at 45 people before we asked for increase. Yet we know this impacted numbers.
